#### JOURNAL OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

#### HELD ON MONDAY, MARCH 2, 1970

The Annual Town Meeting held at the Hanover High School was called to order by George H. Lewald, Moderator, at 8:25 P.M. on Monday, March 2, 1970 with 793 voters present.

Voters were checked in by Josephine Kendrigan, Annie Michalowski, Mary Downing, Mary Smith, Barbara Smith and Lois Kendall.

Philip H. MacAllister, Vice-Commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars led the audience in a salute to the flag.

The invocation was offered by the Rev. James Crawford.

The Moderator asked that the Town Clerk record the warrant as having been served and returned as required by the Town by-laws.

Selectman Allan A. Carnes reviewed the situation concerning the war in Vietnam, drawing particular attention to the part that the youth of this town have played in the conflict. Since our last Annual Town Meeting another of our young men, Lt. Thomas R. Gorrill, has given his life in this struggle. A silent tribute was given to Lt. Thomas R. Gorrill by rising vote of those assembled.

Mr. Carnes called the attention of the meeting to the death since the last Town Meeting of Lot Phillips II, and on motion duly made and seconded, a committee on resolutions consisting of Verne S. Melanson, Porter W. Thompson and Wilford W. d'Entremont was appointed.

#### ARTICLE 1.

To see if the Town will accept the reports of the officers and committees as printed in the Town Report, or take any other action relative thereto.

VOTED: That the Town accept such reports.

#### ARTICLE 2.

To hear the reports of the Committees and act thereon, or take any other action relative thereto.

Report of the Committee to Study the Need of a Permanent Recreational Director:

The purpose for which this committee was created was to explore the need for an individual professionally trained in the field of recreation to direct activities, not related to school activities, for all members of a family who are interested in recreational activities. The activities in mind were those akin to those carried out at the various Y.M.C.A.s, or Y.W.C.A.s. There are facilities available for such programs, and with the proper individual in charge a worth-while program can be developed.

The Committee has lost some of its members at this time, but with new interest expressed in town, it is felt a reorganization is in order.

Report of the Highway Department Garage Committee:

This is the final report of the Committee appointed under the provisions of Article 28 of the Annual Town Meeting of 1965. Said Committee to study the advisability of constructing a garage for the Highway Department and to determine the best location for same.

We have outlined in great detail the serious need for adequate town garage facilities in our four previous reports to you. The amount and value of town owned equipment is steadily increasing and the present facilities to the rear of the Town Hall are most inadequate for the proper operation of the Departments involved.

It is the opinion of the Committee that a garage facility should be constructed in a portion of the filled land adjacent to the present Town Dumping area and we respectfully request your support of Article #64 as contained in the Warrant of the 1970 Annual Town Meeting.

We recommend that the Town accept this as a final report and discharge this Committee.

Report of the Doctor Committee:

The results of a survey conducted by the Doctor Committee substantiated the fact that there is a shortage of physicians in Hanover.

Of 2462 cards sent to townspeople, 866 were returned and 777 said "Yes", Hanover needs more physicians. 427 have had difficulty obtaining medical care. Only 44 felt no need of additional physicians and 45 did not answer this question. We are very grateful to members of the Water Department for their assistance in conducting the survey.

In addition to contacting Medical Schools and Teaching Hospitals and advertising in the New England Journal of Medicine, this committee has kept an advertisement continuously published in the Massachusetts Medical Society's booklet "Opportunities for Practice". Dr. Raymond G. Vinal of Norwell has graciously permitted the use of his name as one to be contacted in addition to that of the chairman of this committee. Two responses were received this past year.

It may be repetitious to state that this problem is becoming greater on a national level, as well as locally, every year. However, the Government is presently involved in surveying, and trying to solve this same problem. It is the consensus of this committee that Hanover should

continue to be prepared and willing to aid any doctor interested in locating here. We recommend that the Doctor Committee be maintained for this purpose.

On the basis of the survey, a marked interest was shown by the newer residents of the Town. We would like to have several of these new citizens on the Doctor Committee who feel they might be able to help attain our goal. We welcome Mrs. Ralph J. Hillman, representing the Newcomer's Club, as a new member of this committee.

We recommend that this report be accepted as a report of progress.

Report of the Municipal Golf and Recreation Committee:

Two areas in the town are being studied as possible sites for a municipal golf course. One area is west of Whiting Street, south of Webster Street, and the other area is bounded by Cedar Street, Webster Street, Whiting Street and Main Street. The area is 900 feet from all roads, the reason being that the current owners would find their remaining land values considerably higher as the perimeter land is deep enough to allow a road with houses on each side to ring the golf course. The area of the course would be in excess of 200 acres. At one home per acre and 2 1/2 children per home, this represents 500 children, or twenty classrooms, this being a whole school. We don't think

anyone would question that a school of this size would be at least \$1,000,000.00. This is just to build and not staff and maintain.

To acquire and build this recreation center would not involve much more if any more. Immediately after completion, a golf course becomes a source of income not something that keeps costing the town money.

As soon as we have drawings to present, we will ask the town for consideration at a future town meeting.

We ask that this be considered a report of progress.

Report of Housing Authority Committee:

This is a continued report by the Committee appointed under the provision of Article #42 of the Annual Town Meeting of 1968, said Committee to determine need for a Housing Authority.

As a result of the survey made by the Committee in 1969, it was shown that over one hundred persons desired and felt they were eligible for Housing for the Elderly.

The Committee feels that due to this response a Housing Authority is needed.

An Article to this effect is in the warrant. This Committee feels that the passage of this article would benefit both the elderly and the Town of Hanover.

North Plymouth County Refuse Disposal Planning Committee:

At the Hanover, Hanson and Norwell Town Meetings of 1968, Articles were passed creating three member committees in each town, charged with the duty of investigating the solid waste disposal problems of their respective towns and the possibility of solving the problems on a regional basis. These town committees joined to form a planning group and proceeded to invite other surrounding towns to join them. As a result of these invitations, the Town of Whitman formed a Committee and joined the group which became known as the North Plymouth County Refuse Disposal Planning Committee.

The firm of Camp, Dresser and McKee was engaged to prepare a two phase report covering all aspects of the solid waste disposal problems in the four towns and to offer possible solutions with recommendations for each town individually and on a regional basis.

After analysis of the many types of disposal methods available it was recommended by the Engineers and supported by each member of the Committee that a sanitary landfill operation would provide a complete and satisfactory solution at reduced cost for individual towns or a four town region. It is a known fact that the sanitary landfill method is not the ultimate solution but would provide separate towns or the region a satisfactory solution at reduced cost for the next 10-20 years depending upon the size of the site selected. In the course of these years, the savings that can be realized, when comparing sanitary landfill to incineration, is well into the millions of dollars. In addition to the savings, it is very likely that during those same years new methods of disposal will be developed that will provide for greater

efficiency at lower cost than present forms of incineration.

The Committee has worked very closely with the Engineers through each phase of the study. We have reviewed the Engineer's reports in detail and it is the opinion of the committee members that a regionalized sanitary landfill would provide complete service for the least cost to each member town. However, other factors must be considered prior to accepting the approach of least cost. Based on such analysis your Hanover committee has concluded that the regional concept offers the following advantages: lower annual cost to member towns; operational efficiency due to consolidation; host community reimbursement for land over life of landfill operation; minimum possibility of future state involvement. Conversely the regional concept offers the following disadvantages; inherent problems of a four-town body politic (Note that no region has yet been established in Massachusetts); reduction in life of selected site by more than 50% for a four town district; only partial control of district operation by host community; and most importantly no significant cost advantage for the host community - in the case of Hanover from \$.50 to \$1.00 reduction on the tax rate.

Since Hanover's King Street site was selected by the Engineers and the committee members as the best location in the four town region or for Hanover alone, our town became the candidate for host community. Based on the preceding analysis the Hanover committee members have recommended that the idea of a regional sanitary land-fill operation is not in Hanover's best interest and Hanover proceed with development of a sanitary landfill at the King Street site on its own. In addition we recommend that Hanover continue as an active member

of the North Plymouth County Refuse Disposal Planning Committee with the goal of remaining abreast of local and state political developments in addition to new engineering development in refuse disposal. The goal of this continued participation to be establishment of a regional incineration program. It should be noted at this point that even when the ultimate solution of "Regional Incineration" is achieved, Hanover will still require a sanitary landfill operation for refuse which will not be acceptable for incineration.

Since arriving at these conclusions and recommendations your committee has assisted the Hanover Board of Health in developing the five articles to be presented at this 1970 Annual Town Meeting. These Articles cover the four areas necessary to set into operation a properly run Sanitary Landfill Refuse Disposal Facility for the town of Hanover. The four areas are namely: land acquisition (2 Articles), preparation and equipping of facility, annual operation and collection of refuse.

To summarize, Hanover cannot afford to delay action on its refuse disposal problem. To do so will result in a crash program later this year regarding another site. Alternate sites investigated will not be as desirable as the King Street site in regard to compatibility, accessibility, adaptability, area cover on-site, years of useful life. It has been brought to our attention by the Municipal Air Pollution Control Board that open burning will not be allowed as of July 1, 1970. It should also be noted that the Massachusetts Department of Public Health is interested in seeing all open burning facilities closed. Hanover must begin a sanitary landfill operation at the existing site this year by purchasing the King Street site now to insure the town of the capability to cope with future refuse problems. The life expectancy of the existing facility utilized as a modified

sanitary landfill is 1 1/2 to 2 years within its existing boundaries and 3 to 3 1/2 years if additional land in the immediate area is acquired. There are also stream pollution problems at our existing facility which may affect Hanover's town water supply. Acquisition of the King Street site is imperative at this time. There are already sub-division plans in existence which will remove King Street as a site if action is not taken this year.

The Hanover members of the North Plymouth County Refuse Disposal Planning Committee support and urge the residents of the Town of Hanover to vote for Article 21 submitted by the Board of Health for the acquisition of a sanitary landfill site at King Street. We recommend that all other related Articles - 22, 23, 24 and 25 be passed over as recommended by the Advisory Board.

A series of discussion and planning sessions have been held since the initial meeting; further a brief study was made of previous Town expenditures in an attempt to obtain some insight to the procedures used to authorize and approve expenditures.

At this time, the Study Committee is not prepared to make any final recommendations, but will attempt to review and analyze the Proposed 1970 Budgets, and be in a position to make recommendations regarding ordering and purchasing procedures at a future date.

The above is respectfully submitted as an interim progress report.

Report of Elementary School Addition Committee:

This committee was voted into existence two years ago and within a few months started the preliminary planning for an addition to the Cedar Elementary School.

Last year at this time the general contractor was on the verge of starting serious work, contemplating unhappily the heavy snows of late February and the likely prospect of a carpenters' strike.

This evening we feel quite secure in reporting that within two weeks the 13 classrooms will be opened to students, although small items of work to completely finish the job will continue for some time.

Presently we believe that all costs involved in the project can be met within the sum of \$635,000 budgeted for our disposition by the town.

We hope that many of you will choose to visit the Cedar School at your pleasure or, certainly, on the occasion of the formal acceptance of the addition.

#### ARTICLE 3.

Prior to taking any action on this article, Mr. Deluse, Chairman of the Advisory Committee, made the following comment:

"Your Advisory Committee wishes to bring you up to date prior to voting on any appropriation. The amount of money from the State distribution has been received and shows an increase of \$180,000.00 over a year ago. This, in relation to the tax rate, amounts to approximately \$3, so that if all the recommendations of your Advisory Committee are followed, there would be an estimated increase of \$6 to \$7 on our real estate tax rate.

Much time and effort was expended by your Committee in sessions with the School Committee and at the urging of the Advisory Committee, the School Committee did reduce their budget by \$9,000. While it appears small in amount, it was significant that a reduction took place.

"Many articles that are in the warrant are desirable, but it is the Advisory Committee's opinion that they may be put over or postponed to the future, or may be implemented by the sponsors by their own votes without town meeting action - if they so desire."

VOTED: Unanimously that the Town appropriate the sum of \$3,535,000.00 for the purpose of constructing and originally equipping a Junior High School having a capacity of 800 pupils and having the capability of being expanded or added to for an ultimate capacity of 1200 pupils, to be constructed on land owned by the Town situated on the easterly side of Whiting Street and to meet said appropriation the sum of \$7,730.60 is hereby appropriated from available funds, the sum of \$1,789.36 is hereby appropriated from the High School Addition account, the sum of \$480.04 is hereby appropriated from the Cedar Street Elementary School Plans and Specifications account, the sum of \$125,000.00 is hereby appropriated from the Stabilization Fund under the provisions of Chapter 645 of the Acts of 1948 as amended,

the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen is authorized to borrow the sum of \$3,400,000.00 under authority of Chapter 645 of the Acts of 1948, as amended and supplemented, and to issue bonds or notes therefor at one time or from time to time payable in accordance with General Laws (Ter. Ed.) Chapter 44 so that each issue shall be paid in not more than 20 years from its date, provided that the amount herein authorized to be borrowed shall be reduced to the extent that any accelerated grant of State Funds is received for said project pursuant to Section 9 of said Chapter 645 as amended prior to the sale of said bonds or notes; and that said project shall be carried out under the direction of the School Building Committee established under Article V of the Special Town Meeting held January 13, 1969, which Committee is hereby authorized to enter into all contracts and agreements in connection therewith.

#### ARTICLE 13.

The Advisory Committee moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,338.00, that \$30,000.00 be appropriated from available funds and that \$10,000.00 be appropriated from the Stabilization Fund for the purpose of purchasing or taking by eminent domain the land described in this article. Selectman Francis J. Mitchell read the following letter, which was placed on file:

#### (St. Coletta's)

"One day last week an indirect message, given me through my secretary, advised that Mr. Alfred Nielsen was soliciting signatures of business people and residents of Hanover who were in disfavor of the continued practice of burning refuse in the local dump. It was requested that my signature should also be added if I was in disfavor of the present arrangement for garbage disposal. Being vehemently opposed, I signed the protest to burning, but sent Mr. Nielsen the verbal message that I am equally opposed to the idea that the dump should be removed to another location in Hanover and there be operated on a land fill basis. It is for this reason that I deem it advisable to state my opinions, and those of the staff, in writing to you directly.

"We are completely opposed to burning under any circumstances or at any location. In addition to the heavy smoke and foul air, we are concerned about the residue fallout and the fire hazard; all too often the flames are visible from this side of Route 53, especially during the dry heat of summer. As you well know, on occasion the fire has spread to the pine trees that serve as a screen between the dump and Route 53.

"We at St. Coletta's, who have too long endured this dangerously unhealthy condition of contaminated air, do not wish to see the health and comfort of other Hanover residents jeopardized by polluted air conditions.

"Furthermore, we do <u>not</u> agree that there is need to relocate the dump site. Our recommendation is that the existing site be converted to an approved land fill dump for whatever period of time it so allows. (Mr. Briggs advised me a year ago that this site could be utilized as a land fill dump for a 3 to 5 year period.) Meanwhile, this would

allow ample time for a thorough study of the advisability of considering an incinerator-type disposal service, or other methods of disposal.

"At this time, therefore, the staff and I at St. Coletta's make three recommendations:

- 1) That burning be completely discontinued
- 2) That the existing dump be converted to an approved land fill type dump.
- 3) That a local committee or group investigate an incinerator, or other methods.

After much discussion, tellers were sworn and a vote taken by show of hands, resulting in 140 votes in favor of the motion and 255 opposed. The Moderator declared the motion lost.

Parcel 3. 12.4 acres of land situated on the westerly side of King Street, at the rear of 575 King Street, shown as Lot 10 and 11 of Plan 80 on the Assessors' map of Hanover.

Parcel 4. 4.3 acres of land shown as part of Lot 1
Plan 80 on the Assessors' map of Hanover and described as follows:
Beginning at a point on the southerly property line of said parcel 590 feet westerly from King Street; thence
Westerly 380 feet to the rear property line of said parcel; thence
Northerly along the rear property line of said property 485 feet to the northwest corner of said parcel; thence
Along the northerly property line of said parcel in an easterly direction to a point 450 feet westerly of King Street; thence
Southerly 485 feet to the point of beginning.

A motion to reconsider Article 21 was defeated, 35 having voted in favor and 259 in opposition.

A motion to reconsider Article 22 was defeated, a show of hands indicating a majority opposed to reconsideration.

#### ARTICLE 25.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or appropriate from available funds a sum of money for the combined collection of rubbish and garbage, or take any other action relative thereto.

#### JOURNAL OF ADJOURNED ANNUAL TOWN

MEETING OF MARCH 7, 1970

An Adjourned Annual Town Meeting was held in the High School Auditorium on Saturday, March 7, 1970 pursuant to vote of the Town at its meeting on March 3, 1970.

Voters were checked in by Josephine Kendrigan, Annie Michalowski, Mary Downing, Barbara Smith and Lois Kendall.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, George H. Lewald at 10:30 a.m. with 24l voters present.

#### ARTICLE 66.

This article was before the Town Meeting on March 3rd when the meeting was adjourned for lack of a quorum. The Advisory Committee had moved the adoption of the amendment as presented.

The following report of the Planning Board was read by Mr. Turner Gilman:

"Following is the Report of the Hanover Planning Board on Article 66 of the Warrant for the Annual Town Meeting called for March 2, 1970.

A Public Hearing on this proposed Zoning revision was held February 2, 1970, in accordance with all Statutory provisions.

Those attending the Public Hearing were generally in favor of the construction of apartments in Hanover in appropriate locations and under suitable controls to insure Public health and safety. Questions were raised, however, as to whether the proposed Zoning Amendment was timely, appropriate and adequate.

The question of timeliness concerns primarily the question of sewage disposal. It is anticipated that in a relatively few years public sewage will have to be installed in at least portions of Hanover. A formal study has been completed and this Town Meeting is being asked to take further preliminary steps in this direction. As pointed out in the Planning Board's annual report, the sewage disposal problems in Hanover's glacial soil make apartment construction relatively hazardous prior to the installation of public sewage, or the availability of package sewage disposal systems of appropriate characteristics.

The question of appropriateness involves primarily the specific areas within which apartments would be permitted. This proposal would permit them in any location zoned Commercial or Business. These zoning districts lie generally along Route 53, with scattered areas elsewhere. Unfortunately, from the standpoint of apartment construction, most of the Commercial and Business zoned areas along Route 53 drain towards one or the other of the Hanover and Norwell

water supply wells, whereas most of the areas in Hanover which drain completely away from these wells are zoned Residential or Industrial and are hence excluded from the proposed Zoning Amendment. Further, present sewage disposal studies indicate that, because of natural topography, there are portions of Route 53 which may never be provided economically with public sewage and where it would, therefore, seem especially imprudent to construct high-density residence units.

The question of adequacy concerns whether, especially in view of the problems outlined, the proposed Zoning revision provides the Board of Appeals with adequate guidance to differentiate between more and less desirable apartment proposals, to regulate design and construction standards adequately, and to limit density appropriately.

It would be very easy for the Planning Board to report that, in its opinion, the proposed Zoning Amendment, as written, is fatally inadequate and should be rejected out of hand.

We recognize, however, that there is a substantial demand for apartment construction in Hanover and that there are elements in the proposed Zoning Amendment which might well be effective, under close control by the Board of Appeals, to enable the increasing demand for apartments to be met, at least in part, without undue delay.

We accordingly recommend that the proposed Zoning revision be amended as follows:

(1) Under Section VI H 1 (B) redesignate sub-paragraph (2) as (3) and insert a new sub-paragraph (2) as follows:

- (2) The density of apartment construction not exceed sixteen (16) dwelling units per acre, and the maximum building coverage of land, including accessory buildings, not exceed 30%.
- (II) Under Section VI H 2, add to the end of paragraph (C) as now written, after changing the present period to a comma, the words:

the probability of the eventual provision of public sewage, and giving especial weight to the recommendations of the Hanover Board of Health and the Hanover Board of Water Commissioners.

- (III) Under Section VI H 2, redesignate paragraphs
  (D) as (E) and (E) as (F), and insert a new paragraph (D) preceding them, as follows:
  - (D) Protection of persons and property from the hazards of fire, by requiring that free-standing apartment buildings containing more than two (2) dwelling units be of at least the grade of construction designated in the Hanover Building Code as Type III, considering the appropriateness of additional construction safeguards in buildings approaching maximum size and, therefore, having high occupancy potential, and giving especial weight to the recommendations of the Hanover Fire Chief or Board of Fire Engineers.

These Amendments are considered to be consistent with the spirit of the discussion at the Public Hearing on the

adoption of this proposed Zoning revision, and if - and only if - they are incorporated in the proposal, the Planning Board recommends its adoption as thus amended.

#### HANOVER PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board moved that the article be further amended as follows:

- (I) Under Section VI H 1 (B) redesignate sub-paragraph (2) as (3) and insert a new sub-paragraph (2) as follows:
  - (2) The density of apartment construction not exceed sixteen (16) dwelling units per acre, and the maximum building coverage of land, including accessory buildings, not exceed 30%.
- (II) Under Section VI H 2, add to the end of paragraph(C) as now written, after changing the present period to a comma, the words:

the probability of the eventual provision of public sewage, and giving especial weight to the recommendations of the Hanover Board of Health and the Hanover Board of Water Commissioners.

- (II) Under Section VI H 2, redesignate paragraphs (D) as (E) and (E) as (F), and insert a new paragraph (D) preceding them, as follows:
  - (D) Protection of persons and property from the hazards of fire, by requiring that freestanding apartment buildings containing more than two (2) dwelling units be of at least the grade of construction desig-

nated in the Hanover Building Code as
Type III, considerable the appropriateness
of additional construction safeguards in
buildings approaching maximum size and,
therefore, having high occupancy potential,
and giving especial weight to the
recommendations of the Hanover Fire
Chief or Board of Fire Engineers.

VOTED: Unanimously that this amendment be accepted.

After considerably discussion, a vote was taken on this article as amended, and the Moderator declared that the motion was defeated, less than 2/3 having voted in favor.

#### ARTICLE 67.

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Law as adopted June 14, 1965 by deleting in its entirety Paragraph F, Industrial Fireworks District, of Section VI of said by-law; and by amending the zoning map dated May 24, 1965 so that all of that property now designated Fireworks Industrial be hereafter designated Limited Industrial, or to take any other action relative thereto.

# By Petition

The following report was presented by the Planning Board:

"Following is the Report of the Hanover Planning Board on Article 67 of the Warrant for the Annual Town Meeting called for March 2, 1970. A Public Hearing on this proposed Zoning revision was held February 2, 1970, in accordance with all Statutory provisions.

It was pointed out at the Public Hearing that, despite the long historical usage of the area designated in the Zoning By-Law as the Industrial Fireworks District for the manufacture of fireworks and other explosive devices, the increasing population density in surrounding areas and the increasing sophistication of devices being manufactured there make it appropriate to tighten the controls over this District.

The proposed Zoning By-Law change would, of itself, have negligible effect on existing operations, which, under the law, would become in part non-conforming areas, but would be able to continue unless abandoned for a period of time. Any extension or expansion of such uses, however, would, if the Amendment were approved, require approval of the Board of Appeals after appropriate Public Hearing.

After this proposed Amendment was submitted, and prior to the Public Hearing held by the Planning Board, it was announced in the press that the occupants of this area were going to cease all explosive operations and move them out of Hanover in the very near future. Under these circumstances, it appears that this is an especially appropriate time for this proposed Amendment to be considered.

We recommend the Article be adopted.

#### SUMMARY

The proposed amendment to the Constitution amends the existing constitutional provisions which direct the division of the Commonwealth into 240 representative districts and 40 senatorial districts. It provides for a census of the inhabitants of each city and town in the Commonwealth in the year 1971 and in every tenth year thereafter. The census in 1971 is to be the basis for determining the representative and senatorial districts for the ten-year period beginning January 1, 1975. Each subsequent census shall be the basis for determining the districts for each ten-year period beginning the fourth January following each census, so that the census in 1981 will determine the districts as of January 1985, etc.

The amendment provides that the house of representatives shall consist of two hundred and forty members and the senate of forty members. In its first regular session following each census, the Legislature shall divide the Commonwealth into two hundred and forty representative districts of contiguous territory and forty senatorial districts also of contiguous territory. Each representative district shall contain, as nearly as may be, an equal number of inhabitants according to the census. Each senatorial district shall also contain as nearly as may be an equal number of inhabitants according to the census. A representative district shall not unite two or more counties, towns, or cities, or parts thereof, or a city and a town, or parts thereof, in one district unless the same is unavoidable. Further, no town of less than six thousand inhabitants shall be divided in forming representative districts. It is also provided that the County of Dukes County and Nantucket County shall each be a representative district, notwithstanding the foregoing. The senatorial districts, each of which shall

elect one Senator, shall be formed without uniting two counties or parts of two or more counties, unless the same is unavoidable.

Each representative shall be an inhabitant of the district for which he is chosen at least one year immediately preceding his election, and each senator shall be an inhabitant of the district for which he is chosen at the time of his election and shall have been an inhabitant of the Commonwealth for at least five years immediately preceding his election. Any representative or senator who ceases to be an inhabitant of the Commonwealth shall cease to represent his district.

The amendment also provides that the Legislature (1) may by law limit the time within which judicial proceedings may be instituted calling in question any such division and (2) shall prescribe by law the manner of calling and conducting elections for the choice of representatives and of ascertaining their election.

Finally, the amendment annuls the existing constitutional provisions with respect to appointment of representative and senatorial districts, although those provisions will remain in effect until January 1, 1975.

#### REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

To the Citizens of the Town of Hanover:

The Planning Board meets on Monday evenings in its office in the Town Hall. When Monday is a holiday meetings are usually held the following Wednesday. Interested persons are welcome at any meeting.

During 1970 the Planning Board held six Public Hearings. The first of these, in February, concerned three proposed amendments to the Zoning Bylaw. Only one of these proposed amendments was controversial; this called for authorization of apartments in Business and Commercial Districts with Board of Appeals approval. After the Public Hearing, the Planning Board by a majority vote recommended approval of the apartment zoning amendment and, by a unanimous vote, recommended significantly increased restrictions. The Annual Town Meeting unanimously approved the tightening of the restrictions as recommended by the Planning Board, but then decisively rejected the amended proposal.

The other five Public Hearings concerned proposed subdivisions. These five subdivisions included a total of 160 new building lots. One subdivision with 85 lots was approved in 1970 following a Hearing in 1969, and two of the five considered in 1970 have been approved, for a total of 124 building lots. One subdivision, with 44 lots, was formally disapproved because of inadequate drainage provisions. If, and when, the deficiencies can be corrected, this subdivision may be later approved. Action on one subdivision, with 32 lots, has been deferred at the request of the petitioner while a drainage easement is negotiated. The fifth subdivision, with 45 lots, has been approved by our consulting engineers and will be formally approved by the Planning Board early in 1971.

Lots in approved subdivisions are not immediately available for building unless they happen, as occasionally is the case, to also have frontage on an existing street. During 1970 a total of 98 building lots contained within existing approved subdivisions were released by the Planning Board so that they could be built upon. This release is normally subsequent to the installation of utilities, drainage and the first coat of black-top roadway; adequate bonds are then accepted for the completion of roads, curbs and sidewalks, which are normally installed after construction equipment necessary for lot clearance, cellar excavation, disposal fields, etc., has completed its work in the area.

In addition to lot releases in approved subdivisions, the Planning Board signed 43 plans submitted to it as being "not subject to Subdivision Control", i.e., they had existing street frontage or otherwise did not constitute, legally, a "subdivision". While a few of these plans were technical changes in boundaries, the great majority created one or more building lots which are, of course, immediately available for construction.

The Planning Board had recommended unanimously to the Board of Selectmen that a Historic District Study Commission be established in Hanover as provided by Statute. This Commission was established in 1970 and among the appointments to it was a Member of the Planning Board. It is expected that final recommendations for the establishment of a Historic District in Hanover will be made prior to the March Annual Town Meeting and that these recommendations will be consistent with the objectives of the Planning Board in making their initial recommendation that such a project be undertaken.

Members of the Planning Board have served on the Town Government Study Committee and on the Town

Garage Building Committee, both established at the last Annual Town Meeting. It is expected that each Committee will submit recommendations for action at the March Town Meeting.

In addition, the Planning Board Members have served on the Drainage Committee, the Continuing School Building Study Committee, and as the Hanover representative to the Metropolitan Area Planning Council.

In consideration of these extensive activites, the great amount of time and effort required, and the substantial out-of-pocket expense and personal inconvenience often involved, the Planning Board again requested in their 1971 budget a modest (\$250.00 per Member per year) compensation. This is intended, not as payment for services, but as reimbursement for expense and inconvenience necessitated by acceptance of Planning Board membership. In this connection, it should be considered that, as of the end of 1970, only one Member of the Planning Board has completed a five year term, and that most subdivisions are active for at least that long a period of time from initial approval to final street acceptance by the Town. Past history shows that numerous Planning Board Members have resigned or declined to run for reelection just as they were beginning to become fully acquainted with the extremely complex responsibilities of membership. The proposed modest compensation is expected, if approved, to reduce this turnover.

An additional new budgetary item for 1971 is a request for funds to pay for the part-time services of an Engineering Inspector. As development in Hanover continues, it appears that less and less desirable pieces of property are being proposed for subdivision. This has increased substantially the amount of time per subdivision

that our consulting engineers have had to invest in seeing that problems, especially those involving drainage, are finally resolved. It is essential that full and adequate inspection be made of the construction of utilities - water and drainage - and the many steps necessary to build adequate roadways. While our regular consulting engineers could perform these inspections, the cost, including the travel time necessary, would be several times the cost of having a Town Employee available to do the work. It is contemplated that such engineering inspection would be coordinated with the Water and Highway Departments, who will ultimately be responsible for maintenance of the facilities and who have previously been called on for such work without any provision for recompense.

One of the most serious unresolved problems in Hanover is making some provision for Apartments. On two occasions in the past, a proposal for Apartments was recommended by the majority of the Planning Board and then rejected by vote of the Town. It is recognized that Apartments are controversial and there is a difference of opinion among Planning Board Members as to the most appropriate solution. All Members of the Planning Board, however, recognize the necessity of some solution to the problem. We are especially impressed by a recent decision in the Pennsylvania Courts that any local zoning Bylaw which does not provide for Apartments is Unconstitutional. While this has no immediate application in Massachusetts, the United States Government has filed suits in several other States seeking rulings equivalent to that in Pennsylvania and it is likely - especially in view of the sentiments of the Massachusetts Legislature which passed the "Snob Zoning Bill" - that we will shortly be faced by a similar ruling. The Planning Board Members, while differing in detail, are agreed that the most

practicable solution would be for Apartments to be permitted in certain districts or areas under close supervision by the Board of Appeals and in accordance with specific criteria designed to protect both the Apartment dwellers and the remainder of the Townspeople from foreseeable problems. We hope to be able to present a workable proposal during 1971.

Considerable time and effort was expended in 1970 by ourselves and others in preparing for and attending Hearings held by the Board of Appeals on the application of a "limited dividend" corporation for a comprehensive permit to build "low cost housing" under the provisions of the "Snob Zoning Act". The problem was made more difficult by the lack, in Hanover, of affirmative procedures, rules and regulations for multiple unit dwelling construction. Despite the fact that this housing was proposed for one of the technically least satisfactory sites in Hanover, the final determination of the outcome, after appeals if any, is still in doubt. Establishment of definitive requirements for Apartment construction would place the Town and the Board of Appeals on a substantially better footing, should similar proposals be submitted in the future.

Recommendations made in 1968 for the planned extension of the sidewalk network and for additional Industrial-zoned areas accessible from numbered highway routes are strongly reiterated.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

The capacity of our water supply has been taxed to its maximum during the past year and the depletion of the ground water table in the well areas made it necessary to reduce the pumping rates and impose maximum restrictions on usage. In addition the extension of water mains has also been prohibited. The prohibition of water main extensions and restrictions on usage will continue until additional supplies can be developed and put into use so that the public health and safety of the present inhabitants will not be endangered by additional usage.

To increase the available water supply the townspeople will be asked to act favorably on a number of articles at the March 1971 Annual Town Meeting. One article will be for the construction of a new two million gallon standpipe. Another will call for the construction of a filtration and treatment plant for the Pomona Well, if the final determination of the type of process has been approved by the Department of Public Health. Another article calls for a study to develop plans and specifications and firm costs for metering all water usage in the town and a full report and article to cover the same to be made at the 1972 March annual town meeting. The treatment plant and standpipe projects have been approached on the basis of getting Federal Aid. However, at this time no funds are available. There is no indication that funds will be available within the immediate year. We will have to raise the full costs of these projects and all water rates have been increased 100% effective January 1, 1971, in order to provide the revenue to enable the department to borrow the money needed for these and other improvement projects. While the flat rate system of billing residential users is the easiest, it does not represent a fair and equal distribution of the cost of water to the user. The meter systems as developed today are the most practical, accurate and fair method of charging for water.

The Highway Department expects to rebuild another section of Plain Street and under a separate article funds are requested to replace the present small diameter main on that street, continuing a program started last year.

A new request this year is for funds to clean existing 40 year old unlined cast iron pipe. Many of the townspeople are continually inconvenienced with dirty water whenever there is a change in flow in the system. Only removal of the built up tubercles of corrosion can enable us to have some control over this situation. Reinforcement of the existing distribution system to maintain a proper flow pattern will have to be carried out in the years to come to more fully correct this condition.

At the time this report was written Seismic testing of certain areas had been completed and actual test drilling begun for additional water supplies. One of the test sites is very promising, but a substantial long term test as well as quality analysis must be successfully completed before it can be considered for development into a new source of supply. Articles are included in the warrant for this purpose so that the new supply could possibly be available for use during a part of 1971.

The Board of Water Commissioners and every member of the Department is fully aware of the inconvenience caused by the depletion of the water supply and want to assure the townspeople that their cooperation is greatly appreciated and that every effort is being made to increase the available supply so necessary for the maintenance and proper development of the community. Until this can be successfully accomplished the continued efforts of everyone to conserve water usage in every way will be appreciated.

The Hanover Visiting Nurse Association submits the following report for the year ending December 31, 1970:

During the past year nineteen Well Child Conferences were held with Dr. Mary E. Butterworth as the attending physician. Immunizations against smallpox, tetanus, diptheria, whooping cough, measles and poliomyelitis were given at Well Child Conferences at the discretion of the physician. These conferences are held for the benefit of infants and pre-school children of Hanover residents.

In cooperation with the School Department and Board of Health, Heaf tests for the detection of tuberculosis were given. On June 10th the Association co-sponsored a Chest X-Ray Clinic with the Board of Health, attended by over 250 townspeople.

Regular monthly meetings are held on the second Tuesday of each month in the morning, with the exception of July and August, and special meetings are held when necessary. Nurses and board members were privileged to hear a variety of excellent speakers during the year.

I herewith submit my report for the work done by the nurses this past year.

This agency is certified as a Home Health Agency under the Medicare Program, and offers the following services to all residents of the town: Nursing (Bedside), Physical Therapy, Speech Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Rehabilitation Nursing, Medical Social Service Counseling, and Health Supervision.

Nineteen Well Child Conferences were held at the Educational Building of the Congregational Church. Dr. Mary E. Butterworth was the attending physician. Each child is examined thoroughly and an immunization schedule is followed at the discretion of Dr. Butterworth. This year two hundred and sixty-four children were seen for physical examinations and two hundred and sixty-three received immunizations. Members of the Association assisted the nurses and transported the children and their mothers to the clinics. This health program is available to children of Hanover from infants to kindergarten age. An appointment must be made with the nurse by calling her at her office at the Town Hall.

Courtesy calls are made to all new babies and their mothers, when such births are known to the nurses. If a birth is a repeat in the family, a congratulatory card is sent to the parents with a reminder that Well Child Conferences or the nurses' services are available to the new baby or the mother. Courtesy calls numbered one hundred and twenty-eight this year and forty-seven cards were sent out.

Health aids and sick room equipment is available to all residents of Hanover on a loan basis. Arrangements for equipment may be made with the nurse. At this time I wish to thank Mr. George Legg, Mr. Everett Stoddard, Mr. Lewis Borne, and Mr. John Hoadley for their cooperation and assistance with the delivery of heavy equipment.

In order to keep up with the new trends and the constant changes in Public Health Nursing, the nurses have attended many in-service programs and lectures through-out the year.

In June I assisted at the Glaucoma Clinic at the Cedar School, sponsored by the Hanover Board of Health.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my nurses, Mrs. Avery Andrew, R.N., Mrs. Meredith Hamilton, R.N., and Mrs. Susan Hillman, R.N.; my secretary Mrs. Elizabeth Amazeen; Members of the Hanover Visiting Nurse Association; and the operators at the Emergency Center for the tremendous cooperation and assistance this year.

The Plymouth County Extension Service's office is located on High Street, Hanson, close to the Plymouth County Hospital and can be reached by calling 293-3541 or 447-5946.

Our legal title is Plymouth County Aid to Agriculture but better known as the Plymouth County Extension Service. We are the educational arm of the University of Massachusetts and the U.S.D.A. at the county level, which indicates that our work is in the field of education.

We have Agents who specialize in Agricultural commodities (Dairy and Livestock, Fruit and Vegetables, Floriculture, Nurseries, Poultry and Turkey) and service commercial farmers in the Southeast Extension Region. Also, our Natural Resource Development Agents service the same area working with individual towns and Conservation Commissions.

In Plymouth County we have two Home Economists and in our 4-H Youth Program, we have two 4-H Agents.

Our 4-H Program is for youths between 9-19 years of age and is one of the most active in the State. Many non-agricultural projects have increased urban enrollment.

We are in the process of formulating a 4-H Foods and Nutrition Program for young people in the Brockton area. This will be similar to our special Nutrition Program for low-income families in Brockton which is

currently supervised by our Home Economist. These are two programs financed by the U.S.D.A. through the University of Massachusetts and supervised by our County Agents.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

To The Citizens of the Town of Hanover:

The Board of Health is pleased to submit the following report for the year ending December 31, 1970.

The Board meets every Monday night at 7:30 P.M. At meetings necessary permits and licenses are issued, matters in connection with subdivisions and public health are gone over and complaints are processed.

Restaurant inspections are on a continuous schedule and each establishment is graded by the inspector and records are on file in the office.

70 Disposal Works Construction Permits were processed during the year 1970.

Several clinics were held during 1970, including Immunization of pre-school children and school children, Flu Vaccine Clinics for town employees and Golden Agers, Heaf Testings in the schools, and a Rabies Vaccine Clinic for dogs. An X-ray Mobile Unit visited Hanover again, at our request, for food handlers, school personnel and residents. A Glaucoma Detection Clinic was also held.

The Department of Public Health at its meeting on December 15, 1970, voted to approve the acquisition of property by the Town of Hanover for sewage treatment purposes. The land consisting of five parcels is bounded by Riverside Drive, the North River, and Elm Street and consists of approximately 23 acres.

The mosquito control program conducted by the Board was a success and we are again asking for \$7,500 to continue the program for 1971. In addition, the Board is recommending to the townspeople that they withdraw from the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project as it

is felt that the \$4,000 can be more wisely utilized by the Town on stream clearance such as the project done this past year at Cedar Street and Hanover Street. The work done in this area should greatly solve the water problem in the Fleetwood area.

The Board has spent most of 1970 in attempting to find a solution to the dump problem. The Metropolitan Air Pollution Control under the State Department of Public Health has notified the Board, several times, that the Town is in violation of their regulations in allowing open burning at the dump. The Board is trying its utmost to control the problem and is presently involved in an attempt to resolve the disposal problem as a whole. While the state calls attention to violations of their regulations, they do not supply any answers to requests for help in finding a solution to Hanover's disposal problems. The only suggestion the state has made is that approval might be given for a sanitary landfill operation at the site of the present dump for a period not to exceed six months. This would not be worthwhile considering because of the limited time period. A special town meeting will be held in the spring to consider what might be done about the problem. Several possible solutions are being considered at present. including incineration plans by North American Incineration Company, a plan by All American Industries, which would utilize recycling, Combustion Engineering which would involve an incinerator costing \$250,000 to \$300,000. Another solution would be a sanitary landfill operation at some other site than the present dump. It would be a waste of money to spend large amounts at present without a careful consideration of the rapidly developing field of disposal possibilities.

The Board wishes to thank the various town officials for their cooperation along with Mr. Fred S. Sanders, who conscientiously served as Agent to the Board of Health from 1956 through 1970. Mr. Sanders has resigned and moved to the Cape. We wish him well in his new home and endeavors.

We also wish to thank the citizens for their cooperation in 1970 and look forward to their continued support in 1971.

# PLYMOUTH COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

## **HANOVER**

#### 1970

In reporting the Project's activities for 1970, we have been able to continue our primary objectives in each town or city. Namely, the reduction of the mosquito population at source of breeding. This was accomplished either by trenching of breeding areas, or periodic treatment of waters where larvae were found.

The bulk of our efforts during July, August, and September were concentrated in areas and wetlands adjacent to encephalitis locales. Fifty two horses were reported as contracting the disease. Although only seven of these cases were confirmed, we had to assume that all were probables, and responded as we did to confirmed reports. There was only one report of virus in humans. As these reports were received, our fogging units responded, treating these areas and others having numerous horses. The Encephalitis Field Station monitored both adult and larvae populations. We like to feel that we, along with the State Department of Public Health, numerous veterinarians involved, and the Department of Agriculture, aided in some part in trying to avert what might have been an outbreak of more serious proportions. Fortunately, we did not receive one report from the Division of Communicable Diseases of Eastern Equine Encephalitis in either horses or humans in Hanover. It is very possible that the program conducted by Hanover's Board of Health could be one of the reasons.

Waterways and drains cleaned were at the Old Fireworks area, Cedar Pond with the backhoe, Tucker and Davis Roads, Riverside Circle, Webster and Longwater Streets, Ponderosa Drive, King and Wood Streets, Cedar and Main Streets, Dillingham Way, Mill Street and Longwater Brook. Also, brushing and hooking of ditches at Candlewood, East Street and Silver Street. We also spent more time hooking out at Beaver Dam and Congress and Reservoir Streets.

Next spring will, in all probability, have an adundance of mosquitoes. Fall rains and present snows are filling the swamplands. We do not have the capacity to control these large wetlands. Consideration of possible harm to the environment will always limit us as to areas

treated and methods of control. We will continue to work closely with the Field Stations, Pesticide Board, the Department of Natural Resources regarding methods of control. Our efforts will be pointed towards possible encephalitis activity in 1971. This will have priority over some past practices.

We wish to again thank the Superintendent of Highways, Town Officers, and especially the Board of Health for their interest and cooperation.

This has been a busy year for our department, the six companies responded to a total of 879 runs, an increase of 140 over last year - 12 of these were major working building fires. We also responded to 50 resuscitator calls. This is an increase of 40% over last year.

Many of our men and officers and all our new men attended the training seminars held at West Bridgewater under the direction of the Mass. Institute of Drill Instructors Bureau of Vocational Training. Also, many drills were held with our ladder truck and our ladder unit went into service in June with a well trained group of men and are doing a fine job. Men of Company 6 trained on Engine 1 throughout the summer so they would be ready to operate their new truck on delivery which will be about the middle of January.

The Board was successful in obtaining a bid within our appropriation for new Station 1 at North Hanover and our thanks go to Building Inspector Paul Litchfield who worked many hours with us on this project. We should be moved into the new building by the time this report is printed.

The men at Station 4 added a new 50 ft. bay to their station to house ladder 1 and we thank them for their fine act, as this was done at no cost to the town.

Work was done on Station 2 at Four Corners consisting of painting the upstairs meeting room and hallway and shingling the west side of the building. We have included in our budget this year, money to shingle the front and back of this building and then it should be in good condition for sometime to come.

We were able to purchase a motor for our rescue boat this year - also to replace the motor in Forest Fire 1 and to make some small repairs on our ladder.

This year we have articles in the warrant asking to replace the 1967 Station Wagon and Engine 5 which is a 1955 truck housed at South Hanover Station. This is in line with our replacement program.

We stayed within our budget and were able to turn back money in our suppression of Fire Acct.

Engineer Albert Hammerstrom resigned from the Board and Ernest Bourque was appointed to fill the vacancy. We thank Al for all the pleasant hours he spent with us and welcome Ernie to our midst.

The Board thanks all departments and the citizens of the town for their cooperation, and to the men of the Hanover Fire Department many thanks to a fine group of men for their loyal devotion to duty under all conditions every day in the week, every week in the year.

# REPORT OF THE SOUTH SHORE REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT COMMITTEE

This year we expanded our offerings to eleven trades by the addition of a course in Automotive Light Repair. This will provide instruction for students who will be placed in smaller garages and service stations.

The additional course in Combination Welding we established two years ago has received a Federal Aid commitment of \$11,468 for equipment and salaries. From this course were sent out our first cooperative plan students. They will alternate, one week in industry with one week in school.

Our outside carpentry project this year is a large building to house the South Shore Natural Science Center in Norwell. This is a fine example of youth serving youth since our young men will erect a project dedicated to the education of South Shore youth in the natural sciences. Our electrical department will provide the wiring and electric heating for this project. The mill carpentry department will eventually furnish the display cases, built-in case work, etc.

In our drafting department, we are providing instruction for several students with physical handicaps. This is in addition to our regular drafting program.

We have continued to upgrade shop equipment with the addition of a drum sander and straight line rip saw in the mill carpentry department. A larger spot welder and several wire feeders were added to the metal department. In the machine shop, a larger surface grinder and two metal-working lathes were replacements for obsolete government surplus property. There were 55 graduates in the class of 1970 of which nine were Hanover boys. The high quality of the graduates is reflected by the fact that 100% of the students desiring to be placed at a time when the unemployment rate in the area had risen sharply. The median hourly rate for the class of 1970 was \$2.52 per hour. Most of the young men have received increases since being placed because they have been able to prove their worth.

Of these graduates, one has entered the armed forces and five have continued their education on a full time level. Colleges selected were Northeastern University, Massachusetts Maritime Academy and Wentworth Institute.

The October 1, 1970 enrollment was 324. With the opening of the new Auto Light Repair program, enrollment increased to 340.

As of this year, facilities are being provided by the South Shore Regional School District for Vocational Teacher Training classes conducted by the Division of Occupational Education on Monday through Thursdays. This is a service extended to the Division in order to provide a source of trained vocational instructors. There are approximately 50 people involved.

# REPORT OF THE SCHOOL DEPARTMENT-1970

As we complete the first year of the decade, education in Hanover, as in the nation, is being challenged and changed at an increasing rate by the society it serves. As never before, segments of society are demanding services that were relatively unknown a generation ago. Society as a whole is asking the schools to offer an educational program equal to that in surrounding areas, to provide programs relevant to student needs and to be more accountable to the taxpaver than ever before. Education, like a ship, is having a hard time sailing a meaningful course without the steady wind but with gusts and breezes from many directions. In this Annual Report we continue the practice of detailing some of the changes Those citizens desiring more informain school activities. tion on school programs and the direction of education in Hanover are urged to call the schools and attend School Committee meetings.

A look at education for the younger child, expanded facilities and services, programs for people with problems, and the business operations along with a few interesting facts and figures comprise this report.

Public kindergartens in Hanover began in the fall for 282 youngsters. The plans had been developed over a three-year period and a Special Article in the Town Warrant provided the funds to staff, equip, and operate the new program until the following school budget incorporated the program. Inasmuch as private facilities were rented to house the students, the success of the program in a large measure is due to the excellent cooperation of Boards of Directors at the Congregational and Lutheran Churches. While the real value of

kindergartens in Hanover will not be known for several years, the findings of the White House Conference on Education, research and experience of other towns, all point to the value and need for educational programs for children under the age of six.

Two milestones were reached this year in providing classroom space for the expanding school population. The Addition to Cedar School opened March 16 thus ending a period of double sessions. The new wing provides two large kindergarten rooms, nine modern classrooms and several areas for special activities. Temporarily, it houses some fifth and sixth graders. This produces a stimulating mix of approaches at the school for the primary grades continue to develop a nongraded approach to learning while grades five and six take advantage of opportunities afforded in a modern semi-departmentalized approach to education. Cedar School thus exemplifies Hanover's approach to education in which different organizational patterns can be blended together for the educational benefit of each individual.

A second milestone in providing classroom space saw plans for an 800 student junior high expandable to 1,200 receive final town approval at the Annual Meeting. Under the leadership of its chairman, John Thomson, the Building Committee engaged Rocheford Construction Company of Natick for the project. As construction progressed on schedule, the educators finalized plans for staffing and operating the facility expected to open at capacity late in 1971. Designed for flexible types of operation, the initial educational plan utilizes a team teaching concept for quality education and a house plan for personalized attention for each youngster. While any new secondary school requires some new staff to man the

shops, gym, office and support functions, the planned staffing seems to be the most economical and efficient for Hanover.

Summer School expands the school year and provides the opportunity for remedial and enrichment education for an increasing number of students at low cost to the taxpayer. In four years the enrollment has increased from 75 to 200 students. New programs for 1970 included Driver Education, Creative Art, Basic Reading, Marine Biology, Communication Workshop and Personal Typing. While the full costs are requested in the budget, the town was reimbursed all but \$5,000 from federal grants and tuition. As the program grows, the town will decide how much of this basic service should be tax supported and what should be paid by the individuals benefitting from the program.

Pupil Personnel Services were organized into a systemwide operation in 1970 to achieve greater effectiveness and more immediate attention to youngsters with special problems. Attention to those with learning disabilities should help these students realize more fully their educational potential while, at the same time, not hold back the learning of the majority of others in a given class. Expanding guidance services should provide more youngsters and their parents with sound help with educational problems if those in need will take advantage of the service. Likewise, Health Services, Speech Therapy, School Adjustment, Reading and Special Class Teachers are working together to locate and treat those needing special help at ever earlier ages. Coupled with the operational reorganization is a financial plan which should allow the town to benefit from greater subsidy from other governmental agencies other than the local real estate taxpaver.

One relevant problem of 1970 may serve to illustrate how the School Department can approach a problem. The danger of drugs to youth seemed apparent and so 23 school committeemen and educators attended over 25 meetings and conferences to learn the extent of the problem and the best role for the schools in the situation. A Drug Education Committee of teachers developed a curriculum and program for long-range education at all grade levels. A citizen based group supported by the schools developed immediate procedures. Teacher in-service education oriented all staff to the danger and action within the school setting. A one-month multimedia program was selected and given on a trial basis to all seventh graders. A Drug Education for Parents course was developed and held for parents through the night school facilities. The activities are being evaluated and, with improvements, the schools will offer to all youth programs to help them meet a problem of the 70's.

A few of the many activities of 1970 warrant a brief mention:

- 141 seniors graduate Dr. Edward S. Mann, retiring president of Eastern Nazarene College is graduation speaker.
- 76 graduates attend institutions of higher education; receive \$36,660 for aid in their first year; other graduates successfully placed in jobs or activity of their choice.
- Expanded free lunch program provides hot meals for needy youngsters
- football team completes second undefeated season, wins 21 games in a row

- girls basketball team began their 1971 season with an impressive record, won their previous 86 games
- one-third of high school student body competes in athletic program
- outdoor science site developed, aids students at all levels to study local Ecology.
- 109 students processed in Driver Education Program save parents money on car insurance.
- mini courses cater to students immediate needs and interests in grades 5-12
- two exchange students from Sweden and Brazil attend High School, improve international understanding
- intensive system-wide public relations program aimed to improve town understanding of school activities
- conferences and cooperative activities improve teacher training and college relations
- special workshops in academic subjects improve skills of staff
- inter-town staff meetings, regional planning and business activities open the doors to greater efficiencies and more opportunities for students
- night school had 787 students in 1970 and, besides the regular evening practical arts and elective courses, started several new programs
- the Hanover Schools were open 304 nights for use by various community and educational functions.

School expenditures for the past year are included for a second time in this report as it is the School Committee's desire to have everyone know how money appropriated for the schools is spent. This same information also appears in the Town Accountant's Report in more detail and is used in numerous state and federal reports which may be consulted at the School Offices. We will continue to report here a simple form of the data figured by the same method each year for comparative purposes. A most significant fact, however, is not shown - that is the amount returned to the town from school department operations. For example, if Summer School cost \$17,000 this would appear in the búdget. However, if federal and local sources returned \$12,000 to the town the net cost, which does not appear, is \$5,000.

Once again, significant money is being returned to the town which should be applied to the 1971 budget. This surplus developed for many reasons which could not be anticipated over a year before when the budget was filed. It seemed better to return any money that could be saved rather than spend it on desirable but not essential activities. Efficiencies in scheduling and somewhat smaller enrollments, effective bidding and government supports and many orders and services which companies could not complete for many reasons all contributed to an overage.

## REPORT OF THE BUILDING INSPECTOR

To the Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Hanover:

During the past year the construction of new dwellings in the Town of Hanover reached its lowest level since 1963. This year was due mainly to the difficulty in obtaining mortgage money and the high interest rates of today.

This office collected \$11,808.00 in Building Permit Fees in 1970 and this amount was turned over to the Town Treasurer.

Several cases went before the Board of Appeals for their decision. These cases required Board of Appeals approval or a variance from the Town's Zoning By-Law.

This office is located on the second floor of the Town Hall and is open Monday through Friday from 9 A.M. to 12 Noon, afternoons by appointment.

## REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

To the Citizens of Hanover:

This year most of the plans have been completed in connection with the rebuilding of the fish ladder, located off Elm St. Many thanks are in order for the Division of Marine Fisheries and their excellent employees. It is hoped with the new ladder the Shad spawning grounds will extend to South Hanover. Here it is noted that the North River is one of the two remaining rivers in the State that Shad will spawn in.

The South Hanover Skating area has been added to in land area by approximately 1 acre. If time and money allow in 1971 some further landscaping will be done.

This year your Committee has purchased 65 acres of land from Dr. and Mrs. Valentine Harrington of Circuit St., West Hanover. This property is a valuable asset to our Green Belt and open space area in Hanover.

Also the Treasurer held a sale of low value back land late in the year. Your Committee purchased about 8 acres in areas they considered important to Conservation.

This year a small map of Hanover will be delivered with the Town Report. Also on display in the lobby of the Town Hall a large map, showing all Conservation Areas within the Town.

## TAX COLLECTOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Selectmen, Town of Hanover:

Again I must commend the taxpayers of the Town of Hanover for their cooperation and excellent response.

In 1965 Total Taxes Collected \$1,609,941.97 from a population of 7,872, (\$205.00 per person). In 1970 Total Taxes Collected \$3,174,936.44 from a population of 10,105 (\$314 per person), an increase of \$109.00. Our tax burden is heavy and increasing rapidly.

Recently I received a copy of "Tentative Proposals" for a Master Tax Plan prepared by a Special Commission established by the State, in which two words were repeatedly emphasized - <u>Tentative</u> and <u>long-term</u>. We must tighten our belts and watch our budgets carefully until this projected "aid to Cities and Towns" becomes a positive fact.

I wish to thank Town Officials, employees and especially the Assessors and their personnel for the help and consideration given this department throughout the year.

I submit, herewith, the annual report of the collections of taxes and water charges for the year ending December 31, 1970.

#### REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY SURVEYOR

To the Citizens of Hanover:

I hereby submit my seventeenth Annual Report of the activities of the Highway Department for 1970.

From the first of January through the first of April we had six major snow storms with much sanding and salting in between. The Easter Sunday storm and the one following, being after Town Meeting, depleted our Snow and Ice budget for the year 1970, this called for emergency funds for the month of December.

With the arrival of Spring came the task of cleaning our streets of winter sand and considerable patching was required. New bituminous concrete surfaces were put on North Main Street, Candlewood Lane and Plymouth Road, with several other streets being surface treated with asphalt and sand.

A complete construction project was started on Plain Street with plans to continue in the coming year.

Our Chapter 90 project consisted of a new culvert being installed on Cedar Street in the vicinity of West Avenue with the intersection being completely redesigned.

The Chapter 90 Maintenance funds were spent on a mix-in-place surface on Pleasant Street from Route 139 to Whiting Street.

A new half ton pickup truck was purchased to replace the 1966 Chevrolet used by the Highway Surveyor.

Under the new Brook Clearance program, Drinkwater Brook was cleaned and widened from Route 139 to Cedar Street.

Considerable drainage was installed on Plain Street with several minor projects accomplished throughout the Town, under the sponsorship of the Drainage Committee.

At this time I wish to express my appreciation to the Officials and Citizens of Hanover for their fine cooperation, also the Police Department, School Custodians and the Communication Center for their unlimited services extended to the Highway Department during the winter months.

#### SOUTH SHORE REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

#### TREASURER'S REPORT 1970

In accordance with Section XII of the South Shore Regional School District Agreement effective January 6, 1960, I submit herewith details of the 1970 financial transactions of the School District.

Details are presented with respect to the 1970 estimated expenditures; apportionment of estimated expenditures to member towns, actual cash receipts and disbursements, balance sheet and statement of outstanding debt as of December 31, 1970.

Total operating costs for the year were \$550,850.83 which involved salaries and wages of \$396,671.13 and other expenses of \$154,179.70 details of which are shown in the cash expenditures schedule.

Capital Outlay costs for the year were \$205,639.66 involving cost of new equipment in the amount of \$36,039.66 and bond principal and interest payments totalling \$169,600.00 as shown in the expenditures schedule.

Expenditures under PL 87 415 Manpower Development and Training Act in the amount of \$609.57 involves return to the State of Mass. unexpended balances of prior year combination Welder and Radio Television Repairman courses that did not operate during the year 1970 due to lack of funds. These courses were 100% financed by a Federal Government grant.

Expenditures under George Barden-Smith Hughes Federal Grant account involves the purchase of new heavy duty Welding Equipment. Various additional expenditures under self-explanatory titles were made as per details set forth in the expenditure schedule.

On June 17, 1970, the School District Committee signed an amended agreement under the collective bargaining law of the State of Massachusetts with the South Shore Regional Vocational Teachers Federation Local #1896, AFL-CIO granting teacher salary increases for the school year 1970-71 approximating an 11.4% raise. The present teachers contract will expire August 31, 1971 and it is anticipated that negotiations relative to a new contract effective September 1, 1971 will begin in February 1971.

During the year, Surplus Revenue in the amount of \$15,000.00 was transferred to the 1970 Operating Cost account to cover additional costs incurred for materials and supplies.

Surplus Revenue was determined to be \$181,056.73 as of December 31, 1970 and was derived from the following sources:

## REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

To the Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Hanover:

I hereby submit the following report of the Police Department from January 1, 1970 to December 31, 1970.

Most serious Crime Complaints to this Department have increased and it is my belief that it will continue.

Daylight house breaks have been a constant problem of the many problems we have had to face. I would like to request of all persons seeing anything of a suspicious nature to call the Police at once and we will be pleased to check the matter out. If you do not wish to get involved at least call and alert us that something does not appear natural.

The need for an adequate Police Station in Hanover is ever pressing. The 153 Arrests last year are an increase from the year 1969. These Arrests mean the Cruiser on Patrol is out of the Town at least from 2 to 3 hours, depending on the type of Arrest involved. It also means added burdens to the Town and State facilities being used.

The Drug Problem is still with us and is a long tough road for persons getting involved with Narcotics. Courses and information on all types of Drugs must be dispensed to the young people by qualified personnel.

I would like to thank Ralph D. Tedeschi of Tara Drive, Norwell for his Gift of Land to the Town for the purpose of erecting a Police Station. It is located on Washington Street, Route 53, near the North entrance to Old Washington Street.

This is an ideal location for a Police Station. It is mid-way between the two largest business sections in the Town. It is also easily accessible to roads leading to the rest of the Town area. Also, of course, it would eliminate quite a large sum of money if land should have to be purchased by the Town for this purpose.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the People of Hanover, the Board of Selectmen, Neighboring Police Departments, State and County Officers, and the Members of the Hanover Police Force for their Assistance and cooperation during the past year.

## REPORT OF THE TREE WARDEN

To the citizens of the Town of Hanover, I submit this report for the year 1970.

Work generally progressed in the following order:

Clean-up after two winter storms.

Roadside trimming on Pleasant, Union, Myrtle, Elm, Water, Bardin, Broadway, West Avenue, and Plain Streets. Also at several curves and intersections.

Dormant spray of Elms.

Sprays for elm leaf beetle, tent caterpillar, birch leaf minor, oak leaf skeletonizer and other insects in particular locations as problems arose.

Continued pruning of the elder sugar maples and removal of those beyond saving.

Poison Ivy sprayed in problem locations.

Sampling, testing and removal of 23 Dutch Elm diseased trees.

Responded to many calls for insect pests.

39 new trees of various species planted.

18 stumps removed below grade.

The new brush chipper has proven to be of much value as a labor saving device and the by-product produced has been used to advantage in many areas along our roadsides.

By far, the most serious problem of the season was the defoliation of Oak trees by the insect pest known as the oak leaf skeletonizer. The spinning down of the worm from the oak leaves caused much nuisance and discomfort to home owners, especially in the Walnut Hill area. Repeated spraying seemed to be of very little value for two reasons. First, because the vast areas of Oak trees at the rear of the homes could not be reached from roadside spraying and the insect is carried from tree to tree by the wind. Second, because of the stringent restrictions placed upon the use of pesticides having any residual effect. Discussion with State authorities reveals that the life cycle of the pest has never been studied thoroughly as it had never created so serious a problem. It is the hope of all local Tree Wardens that more information will be available to combat this insect in the summer and fall of 1971. My sincere thanks to the citizens, town officials, and many departments of the town for their cooperation and assistance.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

To the Citizens of Hanover:

We respectfully submit the one hundred and eighteenth Annual Report of the Officers and Committees of the Town of Hanover for the year ended December 31, 1970.

Your Board in carrying out its tasks the past year has been faced with and acting on increasing numbers of serious problems which affect the public safety, financial security and general well being of the Citizens of the Town of Hanover. Some of these problems are, and not in the order of importance; narcotics and drug abuse, excessive speeding, Police and Fire protection, gravel removal permits, issuance and policing of gasoline service station licenses, issuance and policing of alcoholic beverage licenses, property maintenance, collective bargaining with police, street lighting, real estate tax relief, town expenditures, dog complaints, state legislation, civil defense, flooding complaints and others.

Regular scheduled meetings were held each Monday evening, and the first and third Wednesday of each month to deal with these problems and routine town business.

Special meetings were held on other days and evenings to investigate special problems, to investigate complaints and to conduct hearings. Other meetings were attended with Town Boards, Commissions, Committees and Department Heads with the intent of resolving problems having a direct bearing towards an efficient and coordinated town operation. Our experience in this area prompted this Board to sponsor an article at the last Annual Town Meeting to create a committee to study our town operations with an

eye towards a more related and coordinated operation. Francis J. Mitchell is the Board's representative on this committee and the committee will be reporting at the Annual Town Meeting in 1971.

We also met with our State Senator and State Representative on many occasions to discuss pending legislation affecting the Town of Hanover and advised them of our opinion of areas of legislation that we felt required special attention as it concerned the Town of Hanover.

One area in particular is the M.B.T.A. assessment. Howard Levings is the Board's representative at the Advisory Committee meetings and because of the information conveyed to this Board by Mr. Levings and the services not being received for the assessment we are paying, this Board has again asked our Representative to seek legislation to remove Hanover from the District. In addition we voted favorably for a bill requesting a change in the method of assessment which would reduce the assessment to the Town of Hanover in the event we are unable to withdraw.

The Board was pleased at the creation of the Housing Authority for the Town of Hanover. Allan A. Carnes represented the Board in initiating the local legislation to enact the Authority. We are looking forward to favorable action by this group.

During the past year the following Citizens retired, resigned, or completed their term of office.

Emerson Merritt - Board of Appeals Verne Melanson - Personnel Board Norman Robbins - Personnel Board Joseph D. Badot - Board of Assessors Albert Hammarstrom - Board of Fire Engineers William I. Coffin, Jr. - Drainage Committee Philip C. Beal - Board of Water Commissioners

Each of these men have devoted many hours of unselfish service to the Town of Hanover and we wish to express our appreciation on behalf of the citizens of Hanover for their excellent services.

The Town lost two of its distinguished citizens during the past year - Frederick F. Nagel devoted more than thirty years of service to the Citizens of Hanover and was formerly a member of the Board of Selectmen. The 1960 Town Report was dedicated in his honor. John L. Wilson was a member of the Industrial Development Commission and contributed greatly to its undertakings. The Board extends its sympathy to the families of these devoted men.

It was our pleasure to issue Proclamations honoring the following:

The Board represented the Town at the services of Richard Cardinal Cushing who chose the Portiuncula Chapel at St. Coletta's School as his final resting place. The School has since been renamed the Cardinal Cushing School and Training Center, Inc.

Your Board has had occasion to meet with the Advisory Committee on specific problems and wishes to commend the Committee for the devoted effort and untiring service that they contribute to the Town of Hanover. Their ability and the time they take to keep their finger on the pulse of activity existing in the Town's operations enables them to operate with one eye on economics and the other on necessary services.

The Board wishes to remind all its citizens that its meetings are open to the public and extends an invitation to feel free to attend and to not hesitate on contacting the Board regarding any problem they may have.

The Board thanks all its citizens for their cooperation in the matters it undertakes and will continue to direct itself toward continued service with the best interests of the citizens of the Town of Hanover as its primary goal.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF APPEALS

To the Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Hanover:

The Zoning Board of Appeals held eighteen public hearings during the year 1970 on petitions for variance of the By-law, appeals of decisions made by administrative officials, applications for permitted uses requiring approval, and an application for construction of Low and Moderate Income Housing, authorized by Chapter 774, Acts of 1969, Massachusetts General Laws.

Thirteen decisions were filed with the office of Town Clerk as prescribed by statute, and two will be filed in January 1971. One petition of appeal was withdrawn without prejudice by the appellant, and three others returned to the petitioners because of insufficient information.

Two Board decisions, adverse to a petitioner and an applicant, were appealed to higher authority: Case No. 70-4, Tri-Town Realty, Inc., to Hingham District Court, - decision still pending; and Case No. 70-5, Country Village Corporation, to the Housing Appeals Committee, Department of Community Affairs, Commonwealth of Mass., - decision still pending.

Emerson S. Merritt, after several years of faithful service as an Associate Member of the Board, resigned, and Russell F. Ripley was appointed to this vacancy by the Board of Selectmen.

We wish to thank all of the Town Officials for the splendid cooperation rendered to us this year, especially the personnel of the Board of Assessors.
